The UMB BioPark is a privately developed biomedical research park on the west side of the campus housing private tenants and University researchers who are commercializing bioscience innovations. The 10-acre BioPark will include 1.2 million square feet of wet lab and office space in 10 buildings at final build-out. Its first multi-tenant building, at 800 West Baltimore Street and the BioPark Garage, opened in 2005. Building Two, a 210,000 square foot wet lab and office structure opened in spring 2008. Building Three currently under construction at West Baltimore and Poppleton Streets will open the fall of 2009. Maryland's new Forensic Medical Center will open in the BioPark in 2010.

Disability Support Services

The University is committed to providing excellent educational programs for all qualified students who enroll in one of our many academic disciplines, irrespective of their differences. Thus, we strive to make our programs, services, activities and facilities reasonably accessible to all.

The Office of Student Services acts as an ombudsman and liaison for the identification and provision of reasonable accommodations that may include educational support services designed to assist qualified students with disabilities in achieving their academic goals. To request accommodations and support services, an enrolled student must first self-identify her- or himself as an individual with a qualifying disability. The initial self-identification should be made to the campus Coordinator of Educational Support Services, Cynthia Rice, in the Office of Student Services, Suite 237/238 in the Student Center at Pine Street building.

To initiate the interactive process, the student must schedule an appointment with the UMB coordinator by calling 410-706-7117. This process involves discussions among the coordinator, student and the school or program. It is designed to confirm that the student has a qualifying disability and to identify and implement reasonable accommodations agreed upon between the student and the school. Student Financial Aid and Education administers all institutional, state, and federal aid programs for the University. Aid packages may include a combination of federal loans, federal and state grants, state, institutional and private scholarships, and federal work study. All of these programs are designed to assist students in paying their tuition and fees and to provide for modest living expenses.

To qualify for aid, students must apply annually and meet certain eligibility requirements. Students seeking financial aid must file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form. Students are encouraged to complete this form online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Because grants are limited, it is strongly recommended that students apply beginning January 1 but prior to March 1. Priority is given to students who complete their application by March 1 and list UMB – 002104 as one of the schools to receive their FAFSA output information. Students who are considered residents of the state of Maryland for tuition purposes should view the Maryland Higher Education Commission's Web site for information on state-funded grants/scholarships at www.mhec.state.md.us.

Student Financial Aid and Education participates in the Federal Work Study Program. Students who are awarded federal work study must choose from a list of part-time jobs listed on the financial aid Web site. Hourly wages vary depending on the breadth and scope of the positions. You can stay in shape year-round right on campus with programs and activities offered through the Department of Recreation & Wellness Services (RWS). The RWS's goal is to provide a comprehensive recreation and wellness program

on campus. The department offers a variety of group fitness, conditioning and wellness based classes, intramural sports, and instructional programs. Other offerings include mini-screening, diet analysis, a fitness walking program, fitness assessments, equipment orientations, educational sessions and personal training.

The old facility, the University Athletic Center, closed in July 2008 for a year-long renovation and retrofit into the new Campus Center which is scheduled to open in the summer of 2009. In addition to the Campus Center project, RWS will open the new University Fitness at the BioPark in August 2008. Students are admitted free with University One Card ID to all RWS facilities; others pay a membership fee.

The BioPark Fitness Center with over forty new pieces of cardio-equipment including treadmills, ellipticals, cross trainers, steppers, and bikes, strength training machines as well as free weights are available. The Center also includes a studio for group exercise classes, table tennis and badminton. Classes include aerobics, total body, core training, cardio-box, yoga, pilates, and more. The facility also has men's and women's locker rooms with showers and lockers.

The Department, in conjunction with the University Police Force, offers Rape Aggression Defense, a self-defense course for women. Sessions are offered year-round and taught by trained and certified instructors.

Intramural sports include flag football, soccer and softball.

STRESS REDUCTION RESOURCE CENTER

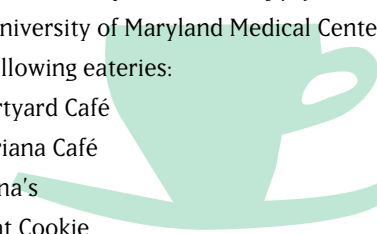
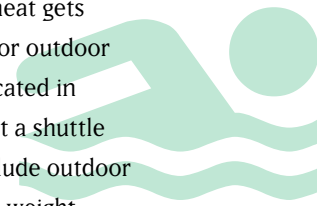

Student Health provides comprehensive care to students. Routine physical exams, sick visits, and gynecological services, including health maintenance and family planning, are among the free services provided to students. Many birth control pills, the birth control patch, as well as the Nuva Ring, can be purchased at a discounted price from the pharmacy at the University of Maryland Medical Center or the University Pharmacy at the Professional Building, located at Redwood and Paca. Students receiving this discounted price must have their gynecological care through Student Health. We also offer the full range of family



planning options, such as IUDs and Implanon.

Your entire family can receive care at the same office through University Family Medicine, the clinical practice of the School of Medicine's Department of Family Medicine. Comprehensive care, including pediatrics, gynecology, minor surgery, and routine prenatal care and delivery, is available.

Patients are generally seen by appointment, but walk-in appointments are also available. A doctor can be reached after hours and on weekends at 410-328-8792. If you think you need to be seen after hours, call to speak with the doctor on call. Do not go directly to the emergency room unless the situation is life-threatening. A call to Student Health can save you money, time, and frustration.

Student Health is dedicated to providing you with the highest quality care in a friendly and expedient manner. The office sees itself as your "doctor away from home." The staff maintains a policy of strict confidentiality and will not release information without the student's written permission.

Student Accounting bills full-time students with the exception of the Evening Law program for health insurance in the fall, for August through January, and in the spring, for February through July. A student with comparable insurance must fill out a waiver and provide proof of coverage to the Student Health Finance Office, lower level, 29 S. Paca Street, for the waiver to be approved. There are two apartment communities on campus: Pascault Row Apartments and University Suites at Fayette Square.

Pascault Row Apartments -- The University owns and operates this apartment community. The Pascault Row Apartments are in eight historic rowhouses that include a total of 80 apartments. There are studio, one-bedroom and two-bedroom apartments available. Each apartment is furnished, carpeted, and has individually controlled heating and air conditioning. Internet access through the campus computer network, cable television and utility costs are included in the housing rate. Laundry facilities and a vending lounge are located on the lower level. Parking is available in the Lexington Garage located directly across the street from the apartment buildings. Students living in Pascault Row are guaranteed the option of remaining in Pascault Row throughout their enrollment. Housing rates are competitive with those for comparable housing in the area, making Pascault Row a popular choice for University of Maryland students.

University Suites at Fayette Square -- This apartment community is located on campus and is privately managed by Capstone Management. The community offers furnished studio, one-bedroom, two-bedroom, three-bedroom, four-bedroom, and seven-bedroom apartments. Rent rates include all utilities as well as cable television and high-speed Internet access through the University's network. On-site amenities include a fitness center, a business center, laundry rooms, vending services and free coffee service in the lobby. This community offers monitored, on-site security 24/7. Entrance into the complex and into the apartments is controlled by an access card system. Parking is available on-site and at nearby garages. The University of Maryland, Baltimore requires every student attending our campus to carry the University Identification Badge, the UMB One Card. The One Card is the official identification badge for the UMB Campus.

The front of the One Card includes a picture, student's first and last name and designation as a student. The back of the card includes a barcode, customer number on the top right, magstrip, and prox number on the bottom right. The numbers issued to the student on the One Card are unique to the student and cannot be duplicated. The numbers link the the student to library and recreation and wellness services, building/door access, printing/copy services, laundry services on campus, vending bookstore, dining services on and off campus, and access to the student's on-line deposit/manage one card account.

The Health Sciences and Human Services Library opened for business in 1998 at its current location. Six stories tall, the library—with its striking architecture, 900 seats, more than 40 study rooms, and three microcomputer labs—provides the University with a focal point for both traditional and computerized information resources and services.

The HS/HSL is the first library established by a medical school in the United States and is a recognized leader in state-of-the-art information technology. As the library for the Southeastern/Atlantic Region of the National Network of Libraries of Medicine, the HS/HSL serves 10 Southeastern states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Students have access to 60 Windows-based computers throughout the library. Students may use databases, electronic journals, electronic books, electronic reserve items, e-mail, the Web, word processing, desktop publishing, spreadsheets, and other software. All computers are equipped with sound cards and USB ports. In addition to 1,500 data connections, there is wireless network access in the library.

HS/HSL electronic resources are accessible off-site through the library's Web site by choosing an electronic resource and providing a last name in combination with the barcode on the UMB One Card. Support is available on the library's Web site or by calling the reference desk at 6-7996. Training workshops are available on a variety of information topics in the fall, spring and summer sessions.

Serving all schools on campus and the University of Maryland Medical Center, the HS/HSL holds more than 365,000 volumes, including more than 25,000 print and digital journal titles. It is consistently ranked among the top 25 health sciences libraries in the country.

HS/HSL's semester hours are: Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to midnight*; Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Saturday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Sunday 11 a.m. to midnight*.

Summer hours are: Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Saturday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Sunday, closed.

* Building entrance after 8 p.m. is limited to UMB faculty, staff, and students; UMB affiliated members; UMMC and VA staff and current USMAI faculty, staff and students. Valid ID required.

A number of study rooms in the library are available for use by law students. Two rooms have been set aside for use on a first-come-first-served basis, the others may be reserved, up to a week in advance, through the online Room Reservation System. All of the study rooms are also equipped for viewing videos and DVDs.

During the week, reference assistance is available either at the Information Center or by appointment.

Collections

The library maintains a collection of more than 500,000 volumes and subscriptions to over 3,000 periodicals, serials and continuations. The library also offers online access to an array of legal and non-legal electronic databases, journals and reference sources, some of which are restricted to faculty, staff and students of the School of Law.

The library is a member of the University System of Maryland and Affiliated Institutions (USMAI) and access to the collections of the consortium members is available through the library's home page at www.law.umaryland.edu/marshall

Copying/Printing

The Thurgood Marshall Law Library utilizes the Go Print system for copying and printing. A debit card may be purchased for one dollar and value may then be added to the card. Copying and printing using the debit card costs 10 cents per page. The debit card may be purchased, and value added, at the card dispenser located in the imaging room level two in the library.

Faculty Scholarship

The Thurgood Marshall Law Library maintains the Digital Commons, an online, institutional repository (<http://digitalcommons.law.umaryland.edu>) containing the research and scholarly output of the faculty of the School of Law. The repository presently contains 736 documents including current as well as retrospective titles, and incorporates new content on a regular basis. The library also manages a Research Papers series under the auspices of the Legal Scholarship Network (http://papers.ssrn.com/sol3/JELJOUR_Results.cfm?form_name=journalbrowse&journal_id=364780) and updates the series at intervals throughout the year.

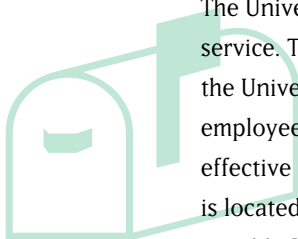

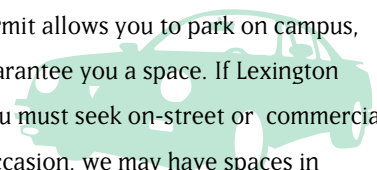

Campus parking is available to students.

Commuter students must have a parking permit (\$5). Once you purchase a student daily permit, you may buy student vouchers, which are sold in packages of ten. Students are assigned to the Lexington Garage (Lexington and Pine streets) at the current rate of \$4 per day (first-come, first-served).

While a permit allows you to park on campus, it does not guarantee you a space. If Lexington Garage fills you must seek on-street or commercial parking. On occasion, we may have spaces in other campus garages. An attendant at Lexington will redirect you if possible. Students may not park in other campus garages before 4 p.m. unless redirected from Lexington Garage. If you do park



in another garage you will be charged the visitor rate.

If you have a disability and need a parking space close to your school, call Student Health at 8-6791 to obtain approval. After receiving approval, call Parking and Commuter Services to make arrangements to pick up your temporary permit. Unauthorized parking in a handicap space carries a \$202 fine and/or suspension of parking privileges. The office also offers the monthly Maryland Transit Administration college student pass. Students can purchase the pass, which can be used on any MTA bus, light rail or subway at the current rate of \$39 a month.

A limited number of monthly parking permits are also available for the roof of Lexington Market West (Greene and Lexington streets). The \$33 fee is payable in advance (before the first of each month), and you are guaranteed a parking space. When spaces are available notices will be posted in the garage and on our Web site.

Pascault Row resident students can pay for guaranteed parking in the Lexington Garage either by the semester (\$275) or for the entire academic year (\$500).

Failure to comply with parking rules may result in a Baltimore City parking ticket, with a fine ranging from \$23 to \$202. Your campus parking privileges may be revoked or suspended if you don't pay fines or if you are a repeat offender. For your benefit, we urge you to carry collision, comprehensive, and liability insurance coverage.

Bicycles can be parked in racks at the Pratt Street Garage, Lexington Garage or the Saratoga Garage (220 Arch Street). Maryland law prohibits parking a bicycle in any way that impedes vehicular or pedestrian traffic. Motorcycles must be registered with Parking and Commuter Services and may be parked only in the Lexington Garage.

Phones and Phone Books

Campus phones have three exchanges: University of Maryland, Baltimore, 706; University of Maryland Medical Center, 328; and Veterans Affairs Medical Center, 605.

To call someone on campus from a campus phone, dial 6 for UMB, 8 for UMMC or 5 to reach the VA, plus the four-digit extension. Dial 9 for an outside line. And note that you must dial the area code (240, 410 or 443) for every local call in Maryland. Dial 911 for emergencies, 311 for non-emergency service, 711 for campus emergencies, and 411 for directory assistance.

Campus phone books, published every two years, are free to students on a first-come, first-served basis in the University Bookstore. Just show your student ID to receive a copy.

Public Safety oversees campus security and the University Police Force has full law enforcement authority. The officers actively patrol all areas of the University around-the-clock, on foot, on bicycle and in marked police vehicles. In addition to the commissioned police officers, the department uses non-sworn

men and women as security officers to screen all people entering buildings and report suspicious activity to the police. The University requires a positive display of identification to enter all buildings on campus.

There are emergency phones in all parking garages and other locations on campus. At night, major routes on campus are well-lit. After hours, most campus buildings are locked; only those with access ID cards for a given building may enter. The department offers safety and security presentations semiannually and on request.

Each year the department publishes Safety Begins With You, which contains the latest crime statistics for the campus and surrounding community. Call the department to obtain a brochure or visit www.umaryland.edu/police/crimestats.html. The statistics are also published in the chart on page 21.

All students must register each semester and session in accordance with current procedures established by the Office of the Registrar. If you want to take courses at another institution concurrently with your coursework at the University of Maryland, Baltimore you must have approval in advance by the appropriate University officials. Inter-institutional registration forms for University System of Maryland campuses are available in each dean's office and in the Office of the Registrar.

Degree requirements vary according to the school or program in which a student is registered. Degree candidates must file a formal application for diploma with the Office of the Registrar at the beginning of the semester or session in which they

expect to graduate. This must be done by the end of the third semester week or the second summer session week.

Students may secure transcripts of their University record from the Office of the Registrar free of charge. A request for transcripts should be made in writing at least five working days in advance of the date records are needed. Transcripts are issued as requests are received.

Diplomas, certificates, and transcripts will not be issued to students or alumni whose financial obligations to the University have not been satisfied. See Student Accounting on page 23 for information.

The University determines in-state status for admission, tuition, and charge-differential purposes when the student's admission application is under consideration. That determination, and any determination made thereafter, shall prevail in each semester or session unless the determination is successfully challenged. Students classified as

Maryland residents for admission, tuition, and charge-differential purposes must notify the Office of the Registrar in writing within 15 days of any change in residency that might affect their classification. The determination of in-state status for admission, tuition, and charge-differential purposes is the responsibility of the Office of the Registrar. A student can request a re-evaluation of his or her status by filing an application for change in residency classification. Applications are available in the Office of the Registrar. Copies of the University's policy are available in each dean's office.

The Office of the Registrar is a key player in maintaining the Student Information Management System. The Web component of this system is known as the Student User Friendly System or SURFS.

The campus-wide University Student Government Association (USGA) is comprised of elected graduate and professional students dedicated to improving the quality of the students' campus experience by organizing and facilitating cultural and social programs. The USGA gives students a voice in University governance. The USGA appoints student representatives to the University System of Maryland Student Council and to the state's Student Advisory Council of the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

While every University student is a general member, your School's student government association or your class decides leadership and representation in the organization annually. If you want to be an official

representative or alternate, see your School's student affairs professional or your student government president. All students enrolled at the University pay a USGA fee when they register. Full- and part-time students pay the same \$20 annual fee. The USGA sends a weekly newsletter, USGA News, to all UMB students via e-mail. USGA News contains University-related announcements and events of interest to students. University System of Maryland Student Council

The University System of Maryland Student Council is one of four USM governing boards that advise the chancellor and Board of Regents of the University System of Maryland. The other three councils represent faculty, staff, and presidents of institutions within USM.

The Student Council was created to ensure that the USM leadership is aware of student views and directly responds to student concerns throughout the year. The council also conducts a systemwide competition for the USM student regent. The student regent has full voting power as a member of the USM Board of Regents. The council selects the top three candidates from the field of competitors and

forwards the names to the governor, who makes the final appointment.

Additionally, each degree-granting institution appoints two representatives to the USM Student Council. Meetings are held once each month and the location rotates among the institutions represented on the council. Maryland Higher Education Commission's Student Advisory Council

The Maryland Higher Education Commission's Student Advisory Council is a statewide advisory and student advocacy group. Established in 1988 during the reorganization of higher education in Maryland, MHEC is the organization that makes decisions affecting Maryland's 13 public four-year colleges and universities, 26 independent institutions, 16 community colleges, and 125 private technical and career schools.

The Maryland General Assembly created MHEC's Student Advisory Council to serve as a forum for Maryland's college and university students to articulate their concerns, perspectives, and issues.

Another role of the council is to conduct the annual statewide competition for student commissioner, who serves a one-year term. The student commissioner is a full voting member of MHEC, which consists of 12 members appointed by the governor. Call the commission at 410-260-4544

Out-of-state students receiving financial aid from another state should verify with their home state whether registering to vote in Maryland might affect their aid status.
