The Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) is an independent administrative court that decides contested cases from private citizens and approximately 40 District of Columbia administrative agencies, boards, and commissions. OAH strives to provide citizens and government agencies with a fair, efficient, and effective system to resolve administrative disputes under District of Columbia law.

More than thirty administrative law judges, selected by an independent commission on selection and tenure, decide cases at OAH. Case issues include historic preservation, tax, rental housing, child support, public benefits, professional licensing, unemployment insurance, Notices of Infraction brought by the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs, the Department of Environment, and the Department of Health. ALJs also hear disputes involving public school discipline and Notices of Violation brought by the Department of Public Works and Department of Transportation.

Each OAH legal intern works with an individual judge-mentor, who guides the summer program. A legal intern's work, though, may be with several judges. The work involves legal research, drafting and editing memoranda and opinions. Legal interns also observe mediations and hearings conducted by Administrative Law Judges. During the summer, interns have an opportunity to observe oral arguments at the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and tour the United States Supreme Court.
