

Recommended Analgesic Agents: *Canine*

	Name / Dose	Used for	Dose	Route	Frequency	Needle Gauge
	Buprenorphine	Visceral, musculoskeletal & neuropathic pain	0.01-0.5 mg/kg	SC	BID-TID	≤ 22
	Fentanyl Patch	Visceral, musculoskeletal & neuropathic pain	<15 kg - 25ug patch; 15-40 kg - 50ug patch; 40-60kg - 75 ug patch; > 60 kg 100 ug patch	Transdermally (apply 24 hours prior to surgery)	Every 72 hours (apply new patch or discontinue; apply to thorax, inguinal area, metatarsals/carpals or base of tail)	NA
	Carprofen	Visceral & musculoskeletal pain	1.5-5 mg/kg	SC / PO	SID (3.5-5 mg/kg) BID (1.5-2.5 mg/kg)	≤ 22 SC
	Bupivacaine	Local pain, nerve block	0.25-0.5% (1-2 mg/kg)	local infiltration (SC)	Administer post-anesthesia induction / surgical site prep; lasts ~8 hours	≤ 22
	Lidocaine	Local pain, nerve block	1-2% (2-4 mg/kg)	local infiltration (SC)	Administer post-anesthesia induction / surgical site prep; lasts ~1 hour	≤ 22

SID - Once a day
 BID - Twice a day
 TID - Three times a day

SC - subcutaneous
 PO - per os (by mouth)

Local Nerve Blocks are recommended whenever possible to reduce the amount of general anesthesia required.

Multimodal Analgesia: synergistic approach to giving drugs with different mechanisms of actions to target different pain pathways and achieve better pain control.

Example includes: NSAID + Opioid (carprofen + buprenorphine)
