Did you know that the University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) remains one of the safest areas in downtown Baltimore?

The University takes a proactive approach to ensure the well-being of our community members through various safety measures including training opportunities for individuals to learn how to keep themselves and others safe. I'm committed to providing a safe and secure environment for UMB's students, faculty, staff, and visitors.

I highly encourage you to complete the online Emergency Preparedness Training so you are ready to act if faced with danger, such as a building fire, severe weather, or an active shooter. The 15-minute training can be found *at this link*.

One of the key aspects of UMB's commitment to safety is our robust security infrastructure. The University maintains the Office of Emergency Management as well as a dedicated Police and Public Safety department that works tirelessly to patrol the campus, respond to emergencies, and collaborate with local law enforcement agencies.

UMB Police and Public Safety is committed to UMB's core values and values-based policing. Its presence contributes to a visible and reassuring atmosphere, deterring criminal activity and ensuring a swift response in case of incidents. Not only that, but our police department also has received accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies and the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement for professional excellence in public safety. It also has won state, national, and even international awards for its progressive, community-oriented approach to policing.

What eventually became the UMB Police Department (UMBPD) began in 1948 with security officers, and Maryland Senate Bill 251 in 1975 created the University of Maryland Police Force. Today, UMBPD employs more than 80 police officers, more than 90 security officers, and 20 support staff. New police officers go through 750 hours of rigorous training at the police academy, 240 hours of field training, 18 hours of annual in-service training, and annual firearms qualifications, as mandated by the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services.

Each year, UMB publishes its Clery Security and Fire Safety Report that includes three years' worth of information, including crime statistics, security measures, UMBPD's law enforcement authority, where students should go to report crimes, crime prevention programs, and resources for students and employees. This report is published by Oct. 1 and sent to all members of the UMB community by email as a letter from the chief of police. Prospective students can get a hard copy of the report from the Pine Street Police Station at 214 N. Pine St. or view it online *at this link*.

The latest Clery report shows promising trends. When we look at crime since 2019, we see steep decreases in robberies, burglaries, and motor thefts. You also can see the log of incidents for the past 60 days *at this link*. 🖒

UMB's commitment to a safe campus environment extends beyond crime prevention. The University invests in maintaining well-lit and well-maintained spaces, ensuring that the physical environment contributes to a sense of security. The campus is equipped with security cameras, emergency call boxes, classroom active shooter door locks, and other technological measures that enhance overall safety.

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UMB places a strong emphasis on safety through community engagement and education as well. The University regularly conducts safety awareness programs, training sessions, and workshops to educate students, faculty, and staff on best practices for personal safety. I hope that you will take an active role in being prepared and check out our trainings *at this link*.

The trainings include Basic Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.), a free 10-hour, hands-on course designed to emphasize confidence and self-discipline while developing and enhancing self-defense options; Advanced R.A.D.; Emergency Preparedness Training; Active Assailant Preparedness Training; Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation and Automated External Defibrillator; Stop the Bleed; and Fire Extinguisher Training.

Campus safety and security is a team effort. I want you to take advantage of the services and trainings offered to you, as well as to be aware of your surroundings when walking around campus. UMBPD publishes safety updates regularly, so look out for those in your email inbox.





The University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) Council for the Arts & Culture is pleased to announce that the much-anticipated milestone fifth issue of 1807: An Art & Literary Journal has been published and is available for your enjoyment. The UMB journal continues to grow in popularity and creative content, and this issue continues the tradition of showcasing art produced by the talented UMB community.



The latest journal features over 80 pages containing artwork and narrative by nearly 70 artists and writers. Selected from more than 300 submissions, the art featured in this issue includes the categories of writing, visual art (such as painting, illustration, drawing, digital art), photography, and varied art (such as sculpture, textiles, clay, metal, glass, wood, and jewelry). Jennifer B. UMSOM'S NOVAK SERVING ON MARYLAND COMMISSION ON LGBTQIA+ AFFAIRS

Wendy Novak, MS, is concerned about the rise in discrimination against members of the LGBTQ+ community, so she's doing something about it. Novak, a research administrator at the University of Maryland School of Medicine (UMSOM), applied for and received an appointment to serve on the Maryland Commission on LGBTQIA+ Affairs.

"I have observed an increase in fear of 'others' and a willingness to be openly hateful of certain identity groups in the last 10 years," said Novak, who works in UMSOM's Division of Cardiovascular Medicine. "In addition, our K-12 public schools are under scrutiny by parent groups that had not previously been involved. Groups

using 'parents' rights' as a justification for the exclusion of minority groups have gained power over the last few years.

"In my county, board of education meetings that were previously ignored have become a battleground over LGBTQIA+ inclusion. Parents had started paying attention and attending the meetings over concerns with the COVID-19 pandemic but now have transitioned to pushing an anti-LGBTQIA+ agenda."

The 21-member commission is tasked with assessing challenges faced by the LGBTQ+ community in Maryland, advocating for more inclusive policies, and working to end discriminatory practices in the state.

Novak brings her experiences as a mother of three to the commission as well as a 20-year administrative work history at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine (2004-2012) and UMSOM (2012-present). She also has gained

knowledge and skills from receiving a graduate certificate in intercultural leadership from the University of Maryland Graduate School and her pursuit of a degree in the school's Master of Science in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Leadership (MS-DEIL) program. She expects to complete the 31-credit program in December. (Read more about the program at this link.)

In the past few years, she has advocated for the support and affirmation of LGBTQ+ persons in public schools by learning

about county, state, and federal laws and guidelines, writing and speaking to boards of education, and speaking in favor of supportive legislation to the Maryland House of Delegates and Senate.

In her application to the commission, Novak wrote, "The challenges facing our LGBTQIA+ community are complex and layered. In addition to harassment in schools, they are more likely to experience intimate partner and sexual violence. There is still much work to be done in the legal system to make sure the laws are just."

Novak, who was appointed to a three-year term, says her experience in the MS-DEIL program is proving valuable in her

role on the commission and has helped her better understand communications between cultures and how to improve conflict management.

"The courses require substantial interaction with the other students, which has been helpful in understanding how identities are developed and change over time," she said. "I am learning about the historical impact of public policies on the experiences of racial, ethnic, and cultural groups. The program is giving me the tools to be a more effective advocate and the skills needed to assess challenges and provide recommendations and best practices for LGBTQIA+ inclusion."

Courtney J. Jones Carney, DPA, MBA, program director, Intercultural Leadership Graduate Certificate and MS-DEIL, Graduate School, is proud of Novak's dedication to LGBTQ+ inclusion and advocacy.

"Exacting statewide change through participation on invaluable commissions such as the Maryland Commission on LGBTQIA+ Affairs is in direct alignment with the call to informed action that is embedded in the MS-DEIL program," Jones Carney said. "It is my hope that as a commissioner, Wendy will be able to combine her passion and knowledge to influence statewide policies and practices that have long-term positive impacts on LGBTQIA+ communities."

POLICING STRATEGIES WORKING AS CRIME REMAINS LOW AT UMB

University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) Police and Public Safety's data-driven, community-oriented policing strategies continued to prove effective in 2023. UMB remains one of the safest places in downtown Baltimore to live, work, learn, and visit.

Preliminary crime data for 2023 shows a modest decline in overall crimes that occurred on UMB's campus. Crimes that occurred off campus or at the University of Maryland Medical Center are not included in the report.

No one should ever be the victim of a crime. Even as crime remains low, UMB Police and Public Safety continually evaluates new and innovative ways to prevent crime on campus. This article, along with the Annual Security and Fire Safety Report, provides transparent crime data, contextualizes what these statistics mean, and suggests ways in which the UMB community can help to reduce crime on campus.

Even as nationwide vehicle thefts rose by more than 1,000 percent since 2020, just three vehicles were stolen at UMB. Police and Public Safety partnered with Hyundai Motor America to receive wheel locks to prevent vehicle thefts.

"These wheel locks can provide peace of mind," said Thomas Leone, MSL, assistant vice president for public safety and chief of police. "Kia and Hyundai thefts have skyrocketed because of a social media video. Our team wants to help you keep you and your property safe."

The department is hosting giveaway events with the Community Engagement Center and the SMC Campus Center for anyone who would like to receive a free wheel lock. Wheel locks also can be obtained by contacting Quartermaster Ariel Turner at aturner@police.umaryland.edu. 位

Property theft declined at UMB in 2023. Vehicle break-ins made up more than one-third of all thefts at UMB last year. Vehicles parked inside UMB parking garages were less likely to be broken into versus those parked on the street. Based on police reports of vehicle break-ins (see Vehicle Break-Ins chart on Page 15):


- Three had valuable items in view inside the vehicle.
- Five left the vehicle unlocked or windows down.
- Six reported a broken window and stolen property, but it was not clear if the items were in view.
- Five reported nothing taken, but a vehicle window was broken (not listed as a theft).

Bicycle and scooter thefts make up 40 percent of all theft on campus (*see Thefts chart on Page 15*). Bicycles should be securely locked to a bike rack using a u-lock through the rear wheel and bicycle frame, as well as a cable or u-lock through the front wheel. Properly securing a bicycle or using a bike cage can reduce or even eliminate the chance of a bicycle being stolen. Bicycles also should be taken home each day and not be left secured to racks for days or weeks at a time.

"It only takes a moment to secure your valuables, whether it's your bike, wallet, or cellphone," Leone said. "We're all so busy, rushing around and answering emails on the go. That email isn't worth putting your safety at risk."

Simple assault is defined as an unlawful physical attack with no weapon nor serious injury. Most cases at UMB are among people who know one another.




UMB Police and Public Safety offers resources throughout the year for students and employees:
