Sustainability Committee Restructuring


In July 2024, the Office of Sustainability transitioned its four working groups (Reduction, Resilience, Engagement and Education, and Green Labs) into one Sustainability Committee. Meetings take place quarterly and are offered in a hybrid format. Membership is composed of stakeholders and subject matter experts throughout campus.



STARS Report

UMB received a <u>STARS Silver rating</u> from the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education (AASHE). This STARS (Sustainability Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System) submission highlighted sustainability efforts and success across academics, engagement, operations, planning and administration, and innovation and leadership. STARS is the most widely recognized framework in the world for publicly reporting comprehensive information related to a college or university's sustainability performance and uses self-reported data to assess progress.

Legislative Impacts

In FY2025, UMB began preparing to submit the first year of Building Energy Performance Standards (BEPS) data to the Maryland Department of the Environment in compliance with the Climate Solutions Now Act of 2022. This will be an annual requirement moving forward.

2025 Legislative Session Environmental Impact Summary

This report summarizes the legislation from Maryland's 2025 General Assembly session. It identifies key environmental legislation passed during the session that impacts the University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) and the work of the UMB Office of Sustainability.

Additionally, UMB monitors the impacts of proposed bills each year during the legislative session. The Office of Sustainability is asked for input on bills that may impact buildings and infrastructure, landscaping practices, energy, and anything related to campus sustainability. The 2024 Maryland General Assembly Legislative Session passed two bills that impact UMB as it relates to the environment and/or sustainability. The Water Bottle Filling Stations bill, SB0096/HB0277, requires UMB to install water bottle filling stations as part of new fountain installations and renovations. The Building Energy Performance Standards Alterations bill, SB0256/HB0049, requires UMB to pay a submittal fee each year as part of our compliance with BEPS. FY 2025 MILESTONES

Living UMB's Core Values: Sustainability Awards, Achievements, and Highlights

At UMB, our journey toward sustainability is an ongoing and iterative process. Our achievements may take us down different paths to reach our goals. This year, we're proud to highlight the following milestones and awards that help us get closer to those goals.



CONTINUING OUR PROGESS

Achieving Sustainability at UMB Through Collaborative Efforts

Apart from receiving awards and recognition, UMB's sustainability team is actively engaged in various working groups, cross-campus partnerships, and external committees. Through these initiatives, the Office of Sustainability at UMB is effectively transforming the university's sustainability goals into tangible and impactful outcomes.



The next few pages detail the progress the University has made on various projects and initiatives through cross-campus collaboration. As a small team, the Office of Sustainability relies on these partnerships to promote sustainable practices and reduce the environmental impact of UMB's operations. These efforts have not only contributed to a more sustainable future for the University, but have also inspired others to adopt more sustainable practices in their own lives.



Utilities and Emissions

Decarbonization Committee

The Decarbonization Committee was formed to coordinate efforts in support of decarbonizing UMB's operations to meet both required and voluntary goals. These efforts range from smaller deferred maintenance projects to large capital infrastructure projects. The group meets quarterly, and members include representatives from Operations & Maintenance, Design & Construction, Construction and Facilities Strategic Acquisitions, the Office of Sustainability, and Project Delivery.

Electrification of Davidge Hall

The new building air handlers use a variable refrigerant flow (VRF) system, where each space in the building can be controlled with a fresh air intake machine. Since the VRF system covers both heating and cooling loads, UMB disconnected the building from district steam service, making Davidge Hall a 100 percent electric building. Overall energy usage in the building is down by about 20 percent, and occupants say that the building has never felt more comfortable.





Green Labs ULT Freezer Tagging

Chilling up ultra low-temperature (ULT) freezers means adjusting the temperature from -80 to -70°C. The Office of Sustainability capitalized on interest in this practice of "chilling up" by putting magnets on ULT freezers throughout campus to promote energy conservation while maintaining research integrity.

Campus Planning and Design

New School of Social Work Groundbreaking and Geo-Exchange Well Drilling

UMB broke ground in October 2024 on its new six-story
University of Maryland School of
Social Work building, slated to be the first net-zero emissions building within the University
System of Maryland and downtown Baltimore. In early 2025, 42 geothermal exchange wells were drilled to provide a renewable source of heating and cooling to the building.







Tree Identification Signage

With installation help from Operations and Maintenance, the Office of Sustainability deployed tree identification signs around campus for 30 different species of trees. These signs serve an educational purpose for passers-by and help the university fulfill one of the requirements for becoming a Level I certified arboretum through ArbNet.

Waste and Procurement

End of Compost Pilot with Baltimore City

Through a USDA grant with Baltimore City's Department of Public Works, UMB started a community composting dropoff pilot in September 2023. This grant ended in June of 2025, and UMB has transitioned from the original Baltimore City awarded grant to an internal collection of food scraps through staff in Environmental Services. With financial support from the University Student Government Association, two heavy-duty enclosures were installed at the two dropoff sites at the SMC Campus Center and Community Engagement Center to provide additional security and prevent contamination.





De-Bagging Recycling

Beginning in early 2025, UMB began de-bagging its mixed recycling materials due to a change in requirements from UMB's vendor that collects mixed plastic, glass, and metal from campus. While these materials are still bagged within indoor waste bin collection spots, the bags are ripped open later in the process, with loose materials placed in large dumpsters for pickup by an off-site vendor.

Education and Engagement

2024 Campus Sustainability Month

Held every October, Campus Sustainability Month is an international celebration of sustainability in higher education. To celebrate in Fall 2024, the UMB Office of Sustainability hosted events including a Field Day with URecFit and Wellness, a Sustainability Town Hall, Meet the Founder with The Grid, Let's Grow Together Plant Workshop, and Campus Cleanup with Environmental Services.



Walking Wednesdays

Starting in 2025, the Office of Sustainability partnered with HR's Launch Your Life to begin group walks every other Wednesday at lunchtime.

While the program took place at the URecFit indoor track from February - April, the Office of Sustainability resumed the program in July, with walks taking place outdoors throughout UMB's campus and occasionally to the Baltimore Harbor. For one walk each month, the group is joined by Officer Anthony Summers and Comfort K-9 Poe.

Gathering at the Garden

A gathering at the MSTF Community Garden was held in March 2025 to plant new seeds and seedlings for the spring season. Herbs, vegetables, and flowers were planted, including tomatoes, radishes, green onions, dill, basil, sage, marjoram, bee balm, and mountain mint.



Education and Engagement

2025 Earth Month

Held every April, Earth Month is a time to raise awareness and create consciousness around the issues that affect our shared planet. To celebrate in Spring 2025, UMB

hosted events including a Swap Party with HR's Launch Your Life, a Campus Cleanup with Environmental Services, a Meet the Founder event with The Grid, a Sustainability Town Hall, a Climate Health Symposium with the Center for Vaccine Development and Global Health, an Inter-Campus Event with local universities, and more. Bike to Work Week

Over 1,600 people registered across Central Maryland to participate in 2025, and for the first time, UMB was one of 18 pit stops for bike commuters. We were able to give away 29 shirts to participants and engage over 50 people.

Sustainability Community on Microsoft Teams

In early Summer of 2025, the Office of Sustainability merged the Microsoft Teams that it manages into one main <u>Sustainability Community Team</u>. This new setup allows people to check out other communities they may not have been aware of. Current channels include Bike Commuters, Green Labs, MSTF Community Garden, SustainabiliTea, Sustainability Academics and Research, UMBuy Nothing, and Walking Wednesdays.

The resources offers suggestions to groups and organizations who are purchasing branded marketing materials, or swag, to hand out on campus.




Zero-Waste Events Guide


Sustainability News

has grown by 26% since last fiscal year.








PARTNERSHIPS
